Since that day, Ann meets these friends at the food bank regularly, with many now volunteering at the site to help others in their own times of need.

With his physical challenges, getting healthy food was more than difficult. It was nearly impossible.

Mark is a 57-year-old man with COPD. He lives alone, and while he has a car, he has difficulty managing the steps to leave his home for groceries.

He's now receiving food deliveries through a program funded by United Way, but in talking with a Community Health Worker through the Pathways Hub, Mark has come to the realization that he can no longer care for himself. Through the HUB, he's working to move to an assisted living facility for a safer, more secure environment.

Following his recovery from years of addiction, Gary was left with partial paralysis due to intravenous drug use. He was primarily bedridden and depended on various relatives for his care. He reached out for help just to find a shower chair to make bathing easier.

Working with a Community Health Worker through the Pathways HUB, Gary found he qualified for Medicaid, as well as some home health assistance. After months of physical therapy, Gary was able to use a walker, and then progressed to requiring only a cane. He's now working on walking unassisted, an ability he thought he'd never have again.

Tom is a divorced, single father. He was just beginning a new career as a plumber, working in an apprenticeship. When COVID-19 hit though, his son was suddenly home from school, requiring round-the-clock care. As he lost hours at work, he got so behind on his rent that he worried he and his little boy would soon become homeless.

But thanks to United Way funds, Tom paid his landlord everything he owed and was able to enroll in a new job training program. He's taking classes now and is excited about the many job opportunities now opening up for him.

His unemployment case was pending, and the payment on the van he'd been living in was past due. 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A fresh start

So she hit the ground running.**

Christine was staying in a hotel after leaving her home abruptly, fleeing domestic violence. When COVID-19 hit, though, she lost her hours at work, and found herself homeless. So, she hit the pavement with new resolve. She was determined to find a new job, and secured an interview, but didn't have an appropriate outfit to wear to the meeting when her money ran out.

Thanks to United Way funds, Christine got an interview outfit – and a new job! She's finally safe and secure, living on her own.

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A call for help

For want of a cellphone payment, a small business was nearly lost.

Tony worked as an independent food vendor, earning just enough to get by with his small operation. In the wake of COVID-19, he knew the only way he'd be able to stay in business was to resume call-ahead To Go orders. But his cell service had been shut off when he got behind.

He reached out for help though and got that bill paid. Tony is now taking orders and adapting his business to a new normal.

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Up to the test

Keeping her career meant keeping her career skills up-to-date. Your United Way was there!

Shirley may have been born in the 1950s, but she wants to continue supporting herself and isn't ready to retire. Years ago, she'd worked as a Certified Nursing Assistant and hoped to resume her old career. She knew there were many new guidelines she'd have to learn in order to pass the state boards. And she admits she's not the best test-taker.

Thanks to United Way funds, she was able to afford and enroll in a refresher course to prepare her for her renewed career. We'll soon find out if she passed her test!

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Adjusting after an accident Jared's life seemed to be unravelling.

Jared suffered a traumatic brain injury from a fall, and the accident left him with a seizure disorder, as well as behavioral and memory issues. A relative recently had to call police for help after a violent outburst, yet Jared barely remembered the event.

Jared didn't have a primary care physician, a medical home base, or a way to pay for his ongoing care because his application for disability had been submitted incorrectly. That's how he met a Community Health Worker with United Way's Pathways HUB, who was able to straighten out his disability application, and match him with ongoing medical care, counseling through Blue Ridge Behavioral Healthcare and the necessary transportation he'd need since he could no longer drive. Jared is now working with a judge through the City of Roanoke's Therapeutic Care Court, where he's eager to be accountable for his progress.
