### **Program and Initiative Descriptions**

United Way of Roanoke Valley invests in the education, health and financial stability of every family in every community. Our vision is to elevate 10,000 families to self-sufficiency by 2030. Learn more about the programs and initiatives existing in your locality supporting this goal:

United Way of Roanoke Valley directly funds partner-led collaborative efforts through our annual Community Investment Process through gifts to United Way's Impact Fund.

- The Early Learners Collaborative led by CHIP of Roanoke Valley is a cross-generational, multi-agency approach supporting
  low-income children and their families. Several nonprofits and public agencies work together to provide healthcare, dental,
  and mental health services for children beginning prenatally through third grade, and incorporates basic needs and
  employment supports to strengthen the family, and engage parents and caregivers as active partners in supporting their
  child's development. Implementation partners include New Horizons Healthcare, Boys and Girls Club, Kids Square, Small
  Steps, LEAP for Local Foods, West End Center, Legal Aid Society, among others
- Strengthening Youth Opportunities for Success (SYOS), a collaborative of afterschool programs, led by Family Service
  of Roanoke Valley. SYOS partners work together to address interrelated needs of youth and their families. SYOS provides
  integrated programs that address academic, behavioral, emotional, health needs, and job skills for youth through after
  school centers, Boys and Girls Club of Southwest Virginia, CAFÉ Arts, Community Youth Program at St. John's, Presbyterian
  Community Center, Teen Outreach Program, Total Action for Progress (TAP) and West End Center.
- OnRamp Adult Employment Project is a collaborative effort led by Total Action for Progress (TAP) in partnership with
  Blue Ridge Career Works and City of Roanoke to improve workforce development and employment outcomes through
  shared screening and referrals that address barriers and increase likelihood of training completion and employment.
  OnRamp enhances the performance of the workforce system to increase employment opportunities for families in
  poverty by cultivating better practices for working with the target population, better referral partnerships with employers,
  and strengthening the integration of training and employment programs available to residents.

Gifts to UWRV also make it possible to engage in the following national partnerships that bring these valuable services to individuals and families anywhere in the country:

MyFreeTaxes (MFT) helps people file their taxes for free while getting the assistance they need.
 United Way provides MyFreeTaxes in partnership with the IRS's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance
 (VITA) program to help filers prepare their tax returns on their own or have their return prepared
 for them for free. The MFT Helpline is staffed by dedicated call specialists who have completed
 IRS VITA program training and certification. Helpline call specialists are available to answer
 questions about MyFreeTaxes, help troubleshoot issues users may face while using the tax
 filing software, and answer certain tax questions that users have while completing their return
 through MyFreeTaxes.



• Singlecare (formerly FamilyWize Prescription Discount Card) is a free and easy way to save on prescriptions. Singlecare works directly with pharmacies to negotiate up to 80% off prescription prices and the savings are passed on to members, free of charge. Interest users look up prescriptions on the Singlecare website to find the lowest available price in their area. Then they download, text or email a free SingleCare coupon card, and show it to the pharmacist at any participating pharmacy location to automatically apply the savings.

2-1-1 is the most comprehensive source of information about local resources and services in the country. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) designated 211 as the 3-digit number for information and referrals to social services and other assistance in 2000. The 211 service is provided by more than 200 local organizations that are committed to serving their communities. Many different kinds of organizations operate the 211 service, including United Ways, Goodwill, Community Action Partnerships, and local crisis centers.

- Healthy Franklin County (HFC) is the Franklin County counterpart of HRV, connecting residents with health and human services, as well as education and quality nutrition from Community Gardens and area food banks. With access to healthy food, information and partner support, Franklin County residents in traditionally medically-underserved areas are able to address barriers to health and well-being for themselves and their families.

- HRV Community Resource Hub was developed to help our neighbors at greatest risk
  receive coordinated healthcare and direct services with the help of neighborhood-based
  Community Health Workers. CHWs housed at key partner sites guide residents needing
  assistance helping them to set goals, connect to available resources, and create a
  customized pathway of services leading to improved health for the entire family.

- The Black Father Family Initiative (BFFI) is a new partnership at United Way that aims to
  be the largest community of support for parents and caregivers of color; with a specific
  focus on fathers. Its mission is to create a space for Black fathers to find meaningful
  connections, support, and resources to promote the health, well-being, and success of
  children, families, and communities. BFFI educates black men on responsible parenting,
  advocates for the importance of Black Father involvement in challenging systemic and



societal barriers, connects with Black Fathers where they are and assists them in building community, and props up services and supports to benefit Black whole-family success.

• Bank On Roanoke Valley (BORV) and Roanoke Financial Empowerment Center (FEC)

BORV is a partnership of UWRV, the City of Roanoke, local financial institutions, and community organizations working together to connect individuals to safe, affordable banking products. Free financial education and one-on-one financial coaching is provided by the City of



Roanoke Financial Empowerment Center, helping residents take further steps to be financially healthy and stable adults.

• Ready Regions West (RRW, formerly Smart Beginnings Greater Roanoke) is one of nine Ready Regions Hubs established in Virginia in 2022. RRW is a collaborative effort of community organizations and leaders working together to ensure that every child in our 16-county region enters kindergarten with the skills needed to succeed in school and in life by providing young children between birth and kindergarten with special support and programming. Ready Regions bring unprecedented levels of coordination, accountability, and family engagement to early education programs in every community in the Commonwealth. This new structure builds on the strengths of Smart Beginnings programs, which served Virginia well for the past fifteen years. RRW operates the following grant-funded programs with support from the Virginia Early Childhood Foundat

following grant-funded programs with support from the Virginia Early Childhood Foundation and the Virginia the Department of Education.

✓ Bright by Text is a parent texting program that distributes child development information, important announcements, expert tips and games directly into the hands of parents and caregivers with children pre-birth through age eight. Message will include alerts to events and resources specific to the Roanoke Valley region, like preschool enrollment periods, safety announcements, health clinics, and free family-friendly events.



✓ Smart2Start (S2S) provides a one-stop-shop resource for parents and
caregivers to search for, and apply to early care and education programs
for their children. Smart2Start utilizes a single application filled by the
parent to check for eligibility and help connect families to available local
early childhood resources that best fit their unique needs and preferences.



- ✓ Early Childhood Registered Apprenticeships supports early childhood providers to recruit, train and retain a high quality workforce across the region. Apprentices are placed at partnering sites, and are able to learn on the job while taking classes at the VA Western Community College.
- ✓ The **Roanoke Regional Mixed Delivery Preschool Program** expands and strengthens access to publicly funded quality care through partnerships with private and public childcare partners across sixteen localities. It includes intensive professional development services for participating private centers; incentives for participating in quality improvement activities; and, robust two-generation supports for families enrolled at these programs.
- ✓ Federal Preschool Development Grant Birth Five (PDG B-5) initiative will accelerate Virginia's development of an equitable early childhood system that delivers stable, affordable, and quality early care and education for the state's families and children, particularly those who are most vulnerable and will benefit the most. In doing so, Virginia seeks to make significant progress toward the prioritized outcome of preparing children for kindergarten, putting them on track for success in school and in life.

In addition, UWRV serves as the regional office for the following state-funded initiatives that complement the work of RRW in serving early childhood programs, children, parents and caregivers.

Ages and Stages questionnaire (ASQ) is available for free to parents and caregivers
online and on paper through the Developmental Screening Initiative (DSI) of the
Virginia Department of Health. The vision of DSI is to promote the healthy
development of children, encourage early detection and provide linkages to services
so that children are physically, socially, and emotionally healthy and prepared to enter
school.



• **Virginia Quality (VQ)** is a voluntary quality measurement and improvement system which supports early childhood providers across the state, and assists families to choose quality programming across different program types.



A successful Virginia Quality site meets the following key quality standards above and beyond basic licensing requirements:

- 1. Child to staff ratios
- 2. Teacher-child interaction

- 3. The learning environment
- 4. staff education, qualifications, and training.

All publicly funded providers will be required to participate in the new unified Virginia Quality Birth to Five System (VQB5) system by the 2023-2024 school year.

 Infant and Toddler Specialist Network (ITSN) provides assistance to strengthen the capacity of early care and education programs serving birth – 3 years old so they can deliver high quality services to their families. ITSN offers on-site mentoring and support, training and technical assistance for caregivers, teachers and administrators, as well as professional development opportunities.
